IN SEARCH OF A STORY

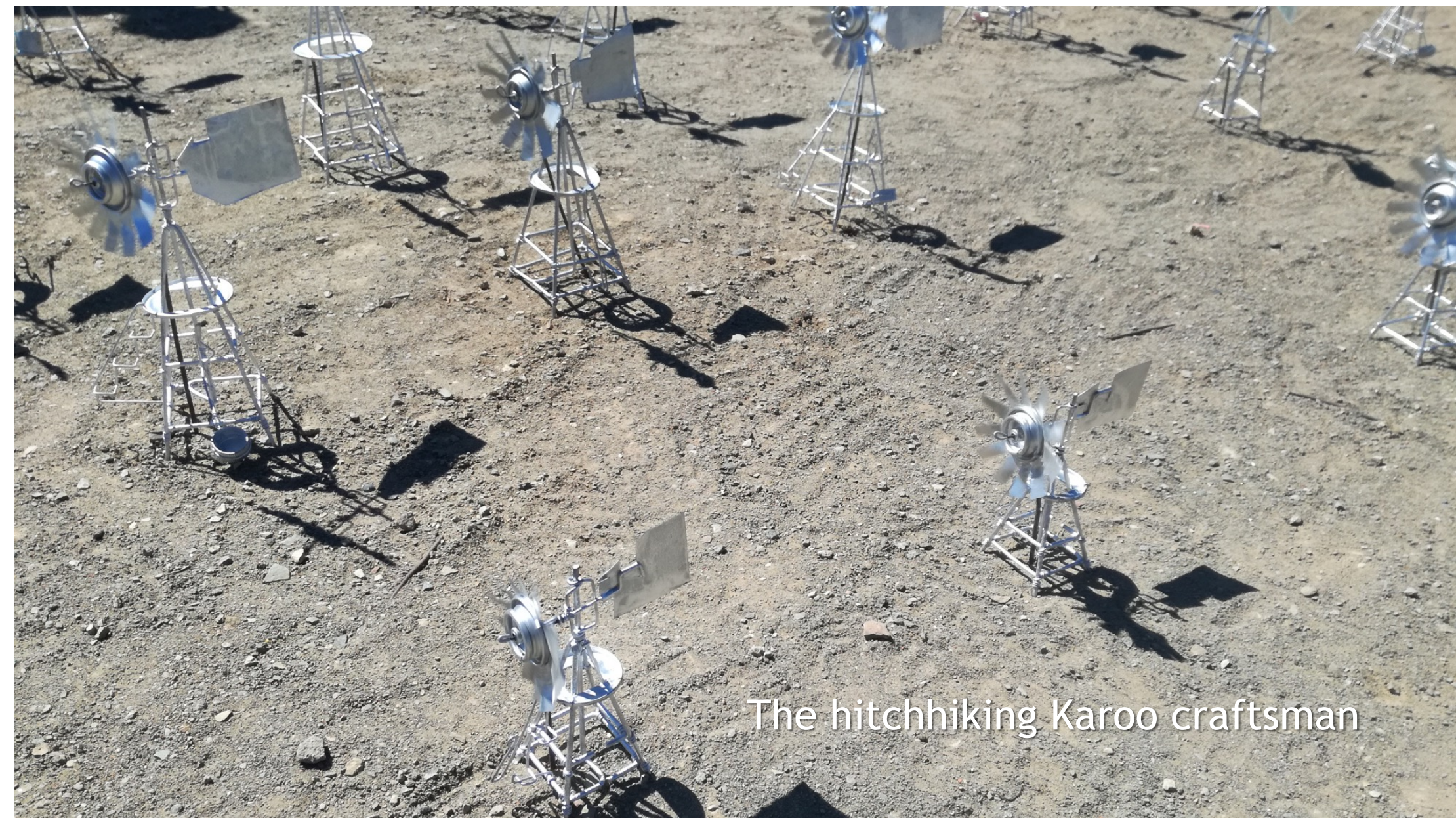
- Research tells a story

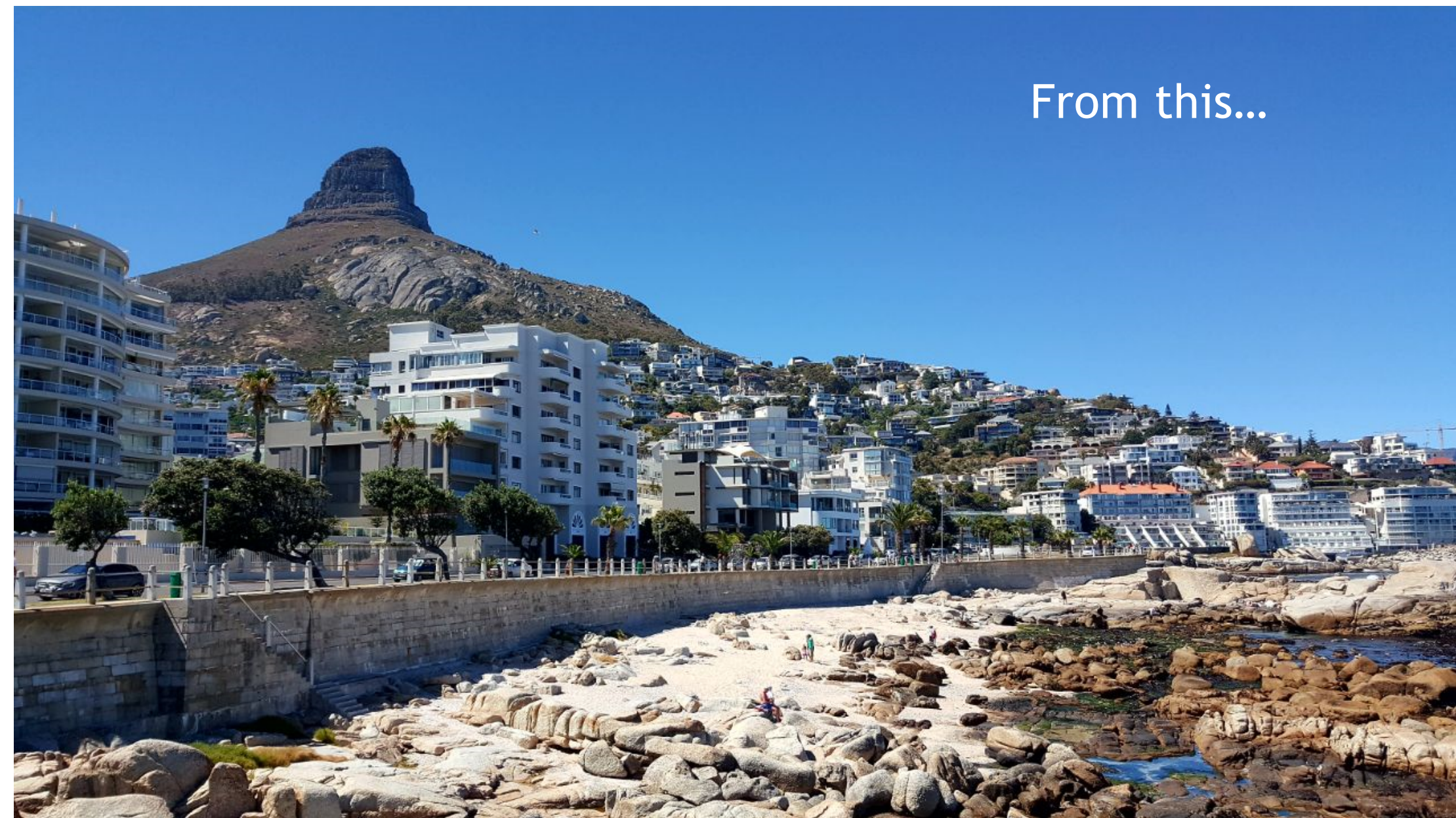

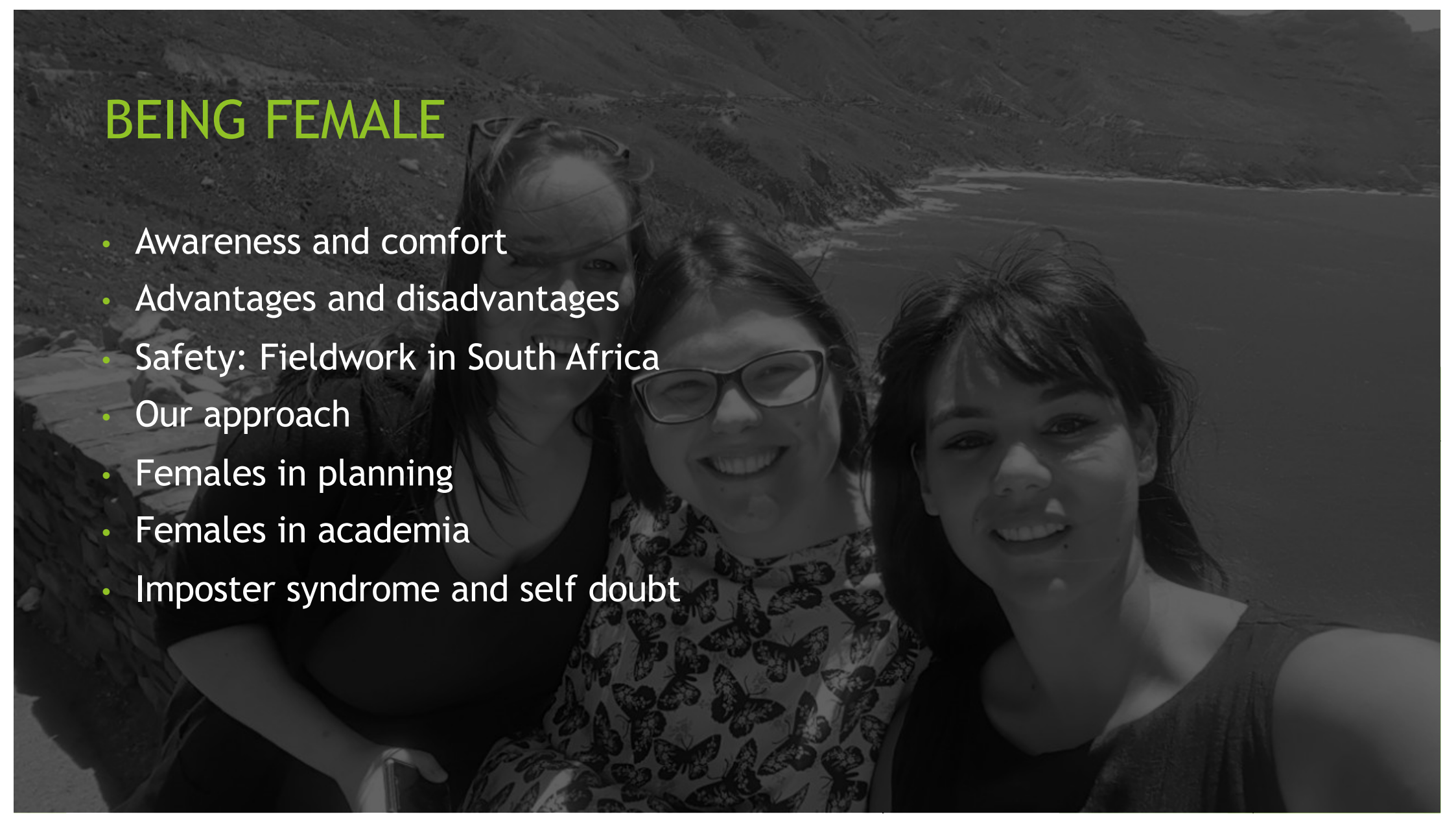
